Federal Office of Culture: outstanding designers honoured

Swiss Grand Award for Design 2019
goes to Rosmarie Baltensweiler, Connie Hüsser and Thomi Wolfensberger

The Federal Office of Culture has selected lamp designer and entrepreneur Rosmarie Baltensweiler, interior stylist Connie Hüsser, and lithographer Thomi Wolfensberger as the winners of this year's Swiss Grand Award for Design. The Award is conferred on the recommendation of the Federal Design Commission. The winners work in very different fields and reflect the excellence and diversity of Swiss design. The awards will be presented in Basel on 11 June 2019.

Together with her husband Rico, Rosmarie Baltensweiler made Swiss design history with the "Type 600" lamp in 1951 and established an internationally successful company that was a pioneer in sustainable production. The innovative family business still benefits from Rosmarie Baltensweiler's ground-breaking work today. Connie Hüsser has contributed substantially to the history of Swiss design, even though her work cannot be assigned to any conventional design discipline. A visual merchandiser by training, she collects objects and ideas and recombines them into three-dimensional collages that anticipate future trends. She also advises companies, brings designers together with producers, designs spaces, and creates exhibitions. Thomi Wolfensberger is a master in the field of lithography and a specialised craftsman. He operates in the background, far away from standards, and with his passion for craftsmanship, technical skills and love of experimentation has enabled the production of works by artists both in Switzerland and abroad for more than 30 years.

The award winners will receive their honours on 11 June 2019 in the Swiss Design Awards exhibition. The exhibition, which runs in parallel with Art Basel and Design Miami/Basel, will also feature works by the award winners. The accompanying publication on the Swiss Grand Award for Design 2019 will appear in conjunction with the event.

Rosmarie Baltensweiler, b. 1927, Ebikon Lamp designer and entrepreneur

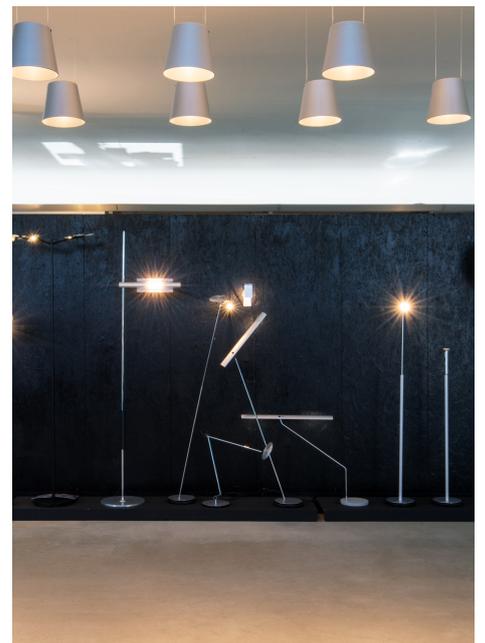
The Baltensweiler family company was founded thanks to the dazzling career of the “Type 600” lamp and is still going strong more than 60 years later. Together with her husband Rico, Rosmarie Baltensweiler built an internationally successful small business while simultaneously raising four children. Their chalet in Ebikon, not far from Lucerne, was studio, workshop and living quarters in one. When Rico Baltensweiler died unexpectedly in 1987, the couple’s son Gabriel and daughter Karin took over important aspects of the family operations. Starting in 2013, Rosmarie Baltensweiler gradually retired from the business. Now, in 2019, the Baltensweiler company produces and distributes sixteen different lamp models, among them a new edition of the Type 600.

The worldwide political situation in the early 1970s proved to be one of the most important impulses for Rico and Rosmarie Baltensweiler. The global oil crisis spotlighted questions of sustainability and energy efficiency for the small family business. Driven by this approach, the company successfully incorporated LED technology into their products in 2007.

A pioneer in the design of luminaires, Rosmarie Baltensweiler has created light fixtures that are now design classics. The lamps’ design was always influenced by a desire to find the right formal language, and embodies the very best of classic Swiss product design. Over more than six decades, Baltensweiler has become a family operation of international reach renowned for innovative technology and timeless design.



Connie Hüsser, b. 1967, Zurich

Interior stylist

Connie Hüsser is the first interior stylist to receive the Swiss Grand Award for Design. But she is much more: she also works as a consultant for furniture companies, designs exhibitions and promotes young designers. With her unerring ability to identify trends, she anticipates what will later become the zeitgeist.

One of Connie Hüsser's most radical and sustainable occupations is the styling for Vitra's now legendary catalogues "Select, arrange". Companies are still trying to imitate the unique atmosphere of their pictures, but without much success. The stands that Connie Hüsser designs for Vitra are always one of the highlights of the Milan furniture fair. She creates unique scenarios and strikingly beautiful three-dimensional collages that are nonetheless of great clarity and cogency.

Connie Hüsser's enduring success is down to her curiosity, love of discovery, and "good eye". As she herself says: "Noticing accidental things, supposedly insignificant things, and recognising their strength is probably my greatest talent." In 2018 Connie Hüsser launched her first exhibition under the label "Object with Love", with a highly regarded show at the interior design fair in Kortrijk (BE). This June, the second edition of "Object with Love" can be discovered alongside the Swiss Design Awards at Design Miami/Basel (*Hall 1 South*).

Thomi Wolfensberger, b. 1964, Zurich Lithographer

The Wolfensberger lithographic print shop, with printing machines named, for example, Emma Stone or Gertrude Stein, represents a slice of Swiss printing history. Since their founding in 1902, the graphic printers J.E. Wolfensberger AG in Zurich have devoted themselves to combining art with state-of-the-art printing. When Thomi Wolfensberger took over the lithography section of the family business in the late 1980s, the heyday of classical lithography had already come to an end. From the start, he found a means of investing the craft with renewed vibrancy through fruitful collaboration with art and artists. He brilliantly exploits and expands the potential of lithography to implement artistic visions, and time and again he has found new means of solving specific problems.

Enduring and recurring collaborations with artists such as Fischli/Weiss, Samuel Buri, Shirana Shahbazi, Huber/Huber, Zilla Leutenegger, Dominique Lämmli, Michael Günzburger, Dominik Stauch, Adrian Schiess, as well as international figures including John Baldessari, Wade Guyton, Wolfgang Laib, Douglas Gordon, have transformed the lithographic press into a pure artists' print workshop.
