For the nineteenth time, the Federal Office of Culture presents the Swiss Grand Award for Art/Prix Meret Oppenheim to three outstanding Swiss culture professionals: the architects Marcel Meili and Markus Peter, the journalist and art critic Samuel Schellenberg and the artist Shirana Shahbazi. The laureates will be honoured together with the winners of the Swiss Art Awards on 10 June 2019 in Basel.

Created in 2001, the Swiss Grand Award for Art/ Prix Meret Oppenheim is awarded on the recommendation of the Federal Art Commission to artists, architects, curators, researchers and critics, whose internationally renowned work is of particular relevance and importance to Swiss artistic and architectural practice. Film portraits of the laureates of the Swiss Grand Award for Art/Prix Meret Oppenheim 2019 will be on show in the Swiss Art Awards exhibition which also presents the participants of the second round of the Swiss Art Competition. Each award carries prize money of CHF 40,000. Marcel Meili, born 1953 in Küsnacht, Markus Peter, born 1957 in Zurich

Meili & Peter Architekten

The collaboration between architects Marcel Meili and Markus Peter dates back to 1987, when they founded their first firm. Some thirty years and three companies in Zurich and Munich later, the duo has participated in major competitions and carried out many projects that have established them as unquestionably influential figures in the Swiss architectural landscape.

Their pragmatic approach to architecture is characterised both by their attention to detail and by a careful study of the specific conditions under which their buildings will be used, and by the bespoke technical and technological innovations they develop for their projects. Meili and Peter strike a perfect balance between creative genius and constructive intelligence, which can also be seen in the many master-plans and urban planning research projects they have delivered.

Their "exemplary practice", in the words of the Federal Art Commission, is based on the complementarity of Marcel Meili and Markus Peter. Marcel Meili studied at ETH Zurich, where he later taught before being appointed to a professorship in 1999. In particular, he co-directed the ETH Studio Basel Contemporary City Institute with Professors Roger Diener, Jacques Herzog and Pierre de Meuron. He was also a visiting professor at the Harvard Graduate School of Design and taught at the Internationale Sommerakademie Berlin. Markus Peter trained as a civil engineering draughtsman and went on to be a visiting student in philosophy at the Freie Universität in Berlin. He received his diploma in architecture from the Technische Hochschule Winterthur. He was an assistant and visiting professor at ETH and taught at the International Summer Academy (Design) in Karlsruhe, before being appointed to a professorship at ETH in 2002. In addition to completing numerous projects in Switzerland and abroad, Meili and Peter publish regularly and have served on the juries of a number of international architecture competitions.

Jury Statement: Meili & Peter Architekten pursue an investigative approach to architecture: From a reading of the urban or an interpretation of the living space to a detail of construction, each project is the result of meticulous research, the smallest details of which are handled in an absolutely methodical manner. Their career as a duo is informed by their individual interests: Marcel Meili very early on pursued a pioneering curiosity in the fruitful territory of the periphery that leads to the famous studies of ETH Studio Basel. Markus Peter investigates construction techniques and their expression, drawing on the essence of the architectural. Together, they have established an exemplary practice that has for years built a theoretical and practical foundation for generations of architects who have followed their rich teaching. This year, the Federal Art Commission wishes to honor the energy – heroic and ambitious, at the same time humble - that they devote to unifying form, space, structure, and construction to conceive each project as an essential whole that is always more than the sum of its parts.

Samuel Schellenberg born 1971 in Zurich, lives and works in Lausanne

Samuel Schellenberg

Samuel Schellenberg first put his pen to work for *Le Courrier* in Geneva in 2004, after studying art history at the University of Lausanne. Now head of the cultural section of the newspaper – the only independent daily in the Lake Geneva area – he has established himself as a committed figure in cultural journalism. Essential given the risk of unilateralism but in the process of disappearing from the generalist press, art criticism nurtures a debate that opens up culture while recognising its social and political value.

In honouring Samuel Schellenberg for his work, the Federal Art Commission emphasises that he "has succeeded, through his investigations, in highlighting trends and issues in society that are reflected in art". With uncompromising resolve, Schellenberg the critic tackles both regional and international subjects and not only covers current artistic events but also conducts in-depth investigations, fearlessly taking on institutions and prominent personalities in the process. Cultivating an interest in subjects that are often neglected by the media, he regularly examines cultural policy issues, publishing in-depth articles on topics such as artists' remuneration, gender equality in the cultural world, and the artistic training and professional strategies of young artists who are often little known to the public at large.

By giving visibility to less-known areas of creativity such as independent art spaces and approaching his subjects from a thematic rather than an anecdotal angle, Samuel Schellenberg enables his readers to discover a rich and diverse artistic community and at the same time encourages that community to reflect critically on itself. Jury Statement: An art historian by training, Samuel Schellenberg is an independent and committed journalist. For nearly fifteen years, he has covered current events in the visual arts for the daily newspaper Le Courrier. Tackling both Swiss and international subjects, cultural policy issues, and strong themes in the contemporary art scene, he has, through his inquiries, succeeded in highlighting trends and social issues that are reflected in art. Preferring to work discreetly, away from the most prominent centers, Schellenberg has allowed his pen to speak for the most marginalized approaches, the great paradoxes of the art world or scandals that have been ignored. At a time when the space for art criticism is increasingly disappearing and the independence of the press is being questioned, the Federal Art Commission underlines the exceptional nature of Samuel Schellenberg's work.

Shirana Shahbazi born 1974 in Teheran, lives in Zurich

Shirana Shahbazi

Over the course of her artistic career, Shirana Shahbazi has developed a unique approach to the photographic medium that has earned her international recognition, both institutional and commercial. Working at the intersection of cultures, Shahbazi, who was born in Iran and emigrated to Germany before settling in Zurich in the late 1990s, is known for the polysemy of her photographs, which invite the viewer not only to contemplate, but also to deconstruct the various facets of the photographic act: the represented object and its sometimes political repercussions; the beauty and acuity of the eye mediated through a personal interpretation of a subject; and finally the power of the printed result, in all its material density. Flirting regularly with abstraction, sometimes venturing into installation, Shirana Shahbazi's works are much more than a test of the potential of analogue photography or the fascinating product of compositional virtuosity. They are the result of an elaborate artistic inquiry brought to life by technical expertise.

Shirana Shahbazi was born in Teheran in 1974. A graduate of the Fachhochschule Dortmund and the Hochschule für Gestaltung und Kunst in Zurich, she has presented her work in numerous exhibitions at venues including the Kunsthaus Hamburg (2018), Istituto Svizzero in Milan (2018), Peter Kilchmann gallery in Zurich (2017), KINDL Zentrum für zeitgenössische Kunst, Berlin (2017), Kunsthalle Bern (2014), Fotomuseum Winterthur (2011) and the New Museum, New York (2011). Her works are held in major collections including Tate Modern, London, the Frans Hals Museum, Haarlem, Migros Museum für Gegenwartskunst, Zurich, Fotomuseum Winterthur, and the Museum of Modern Art and Guggenheim in New York. She was a winner in the Swiss Art Awards in 2004 and 2005.

Jury Statement: Shirana Shahbazi's artistic practice has been widely described and discussed by international critics and exhibited in museums, galleries, and biennials around the world. The images created by the Iranian-born artist poetically and precisely combine themes as varied as the subjectivity of intimacy, the experience of travel, and reflection on identity. The complexity and stratification of her work reaches its apex in her exhibitions, where it becomes clear that she views images as a network built around contrasts and assonances. Shirana Shahbazi also seems to seek pure beauty in her work, understood as a dimension that we should not be afraid of and that can surprise us, because it is inherent in the contrast of brightly colored gallery walls or the density of the urban grid in an Asian city. In Shirana Shahbazi, the Federal Art Commission honors an artist who has successfully revitalized the contemporary photographic idiom. widening the frontiers of the medium and developing a poetic view of the outside world and everyday objects.
